Well known Russian expert, author and broadcaster Stephen Dalziel presents

"The Portland Spy Ring". This was broken 60 years ago this year, and was the most damaging case of espionage for British naval interests. It involved two clerks at the Admiralty Underwater Weapons Establishment at Portland, an undercover KGB agent and two fanatical American communists. Unwittingly Lawrence Oxley's antiquarian bookshop became involved and the public toilets near Alresford Station played an important part!

#### A REVIEW OF OUR LAST MEETING

We had 49 connections, so counting our couples, we had about 70 members at the meeting.

Roy Weller presented an interesting talk on "Green Men and Swastikas as Ancient International Multicultural Symbols of Joy in Winchester Cathedral"



Roy spoke of the many symbols to be found in the cathedral. The symbol of The Cross is of course ubiquitous but there are other symbols less obviously linked to Christianity. The Green Men are carved faces (and one full body) fused with or surrounded by leaves. These are ancient symbols of rebirth and fertility and date from 2<sup>nd</sup> Century Roman times and also appeared in even earlier times in the Middle East.

But (quelle horreur) swastikas in our cathedral? Roy went on to tell us how this symbol has been used and abused. It was known from about 3,000 BCE in the Indus Valley as representing life, sun, power, strength and good luck, once used worldwide and common in Hinduism and Buddhism. The adoption of the swastika by the Nazi Party in Germany has caused it to become reviled and often illegal in the West, though it is still in use with no stigma attached in the East, for example in China and Japan. While some embroidery examples in the cathedral have been discretely resewn, those in stone on the effigy of Bishop Edington (d.1366) remain! See his "collar" We shall look with added interest when we next visit the cathedral.



### **GLIMPSES OF ALRESFORD'S PAST (3)**

"OUR MITFORD" by Brian Tippett



The following newspaper notice appeared in 1792: TO BE SOLD BY AUCTION, on Monday, 29th October, at eleven o'clock. Part of the HOUSEHOLD FURNITURE, most excellent brewing-utensils, a quantity of good strong-beer, about 40 dozen of fine flavoured old red Port, with a large library of choice books in all languages, containing about 400 volumes, and valuable effects, of GEORGE MIDFORD, MD, leaving Alresford.

The story behind this notice is that in 1792, having run into debt, Dr George Midford (as he then spelled his name) had to resign his medical practice and

move away from Alresford with his wife and little daughter, Mary. She later became famous as an author, writing under the name Mary Russell Mitford mainly about the quiet Berkshire village where she lived. But she never forgot Alresford and was proud to say that she was born here. [BT]

#### **AN AFTERTHOUGHT** – WERE MARY & NANCY MITFORD RELATED?

With the TV adaptation of Nancy Mitford's 'The Pursuit of Love' recently attracting a huge audience, and the continuing notoriety of her fascist and communist sisters, the question inevitably arises: Is there a link between Mary and Nancy, beyond the fact that they shared a surname? Clearly there is no direct line of descent because Mary died unmarried, childless and without siblings in 1855 and her family line died with her. And in many ways including their life-styles and the content of their writings they were completely different. If there is a link it is tenuous and rests on the fact that Mary and Nancy (born 1904) were both descended from Northumberland families which were distantly interconnected. There is more about Mary Russell Mitford and her errant father in the new history of Alresford that will be published by the Society later this year. [BT]
