Jude Hayland (*Ctrl-click* <u>Hayland</u>) introduces herself: I began my writing career as a commercial short story writer for women's magazines and wrote for both the UK and international markets for over 25 years before turning to full length fiction. I now write novels and tutor creative writing classes and lead workshops.

My first degree was in English Literature, leading to a career alongside writing of teaching English and Drama. My Master's degree in Creative and Critical Writing (Distinction) led me to switch to full length fiction and I have now written four novels and am currently researching for and working on my fifth. 
## Comments on our 18th Sept talk by John Holden: Ralph Dutton of Hinton Ampner

Our speaker, John Holden's love for Hinton Ampner led to his wanting to know more about Ralph Dutton, the man and his house. John was aware of many anecdotes but there seemed to be no coherent understanding of the man, so he decided to do some research and write a biography. Digging deeply into archives and inspecting scattered objects left at the house, Dutton's unique character became better understood.

When Dutton inherited a Victorian "pile" near Alresford in 1935 his respect for the Georgian period (1714 -1830) led him to rebuild the house with decoration and contents strictly representative of Jane Austen's period.

But soon war came and, while Dutton served at the Foreign Office, the house was requisitioned for use as a Girls School. Our audience was delighted to hear one of our members reminiscing about her time as a pupil there. In 1960 the house was gutted by fire, but promptly restored by Dutton to its former Georgian splender. Another delightful contribution from the audience was a first-hand witness of the fire who spoke with a twinkle in his eye about the fire hydrants that had been tastefully hidden in the shrubbery!

Until his death in 1985 Dutton entertained the great and the good luxuriously at the house and was widely noted as a man of impeccable taste. John's talk revealed Dutton as an unusual character. Some adjectives come to mind to characterize this wealthy unmarried man: highly cultured, private and reserved, perhaps a little effete. But to those who knew him approachable, generous and kind.



It was an excellent talk. We know and love Hinton Ampner, but

now feel we also know the man! For this talk we had a record attendance of 95 which proved close to exceeding the capacity of the Methodist Hall. [MD]
